Ensuring guidance on use of hand sanitizer is readily available and clear to visitors both online and on arrival at the Museum.  Putting a hand sanitizer on the table for family use during session, encouraging use and wiping down with anti bac wipe after workshop.  Blocking access to rest of museum for families, so they stay in the exhibition area.  Cleaning before and after family visit, including wiping down tables and chairs.  Closing shop (empty shop space of all stock) and communicate this to visitors both online and on arrival in the Museum.  Payments and donation taken online, no payments during session.  Hand sanitizer dispenser on LADO trolley used during workshop  Engaging a professional cleaner to clean the whole Museum space once per week. 		Staff member gives instructions to the families in the introduction that she will not be able to come too close to families to help when making craft. If an adult or child comes too close, staff to move backwards where possible and explain why the distance is necessary.				
Contact with objects for crafting and teaching	Staff, and families may unintentionally spread/contract COVID-19 through contact with surfaces of objects whilst learning and making craft.	Resources such as rulers and scissors will be wiped down with anti-bac wipes after use.  If a resource is missing or more is required, LADO uses gloves and wears a mask to give resource to families.  LADO encourages use of hand sanitizer before session and during session.  Left over craft materials will be isolated for 72 hours before it can be used again.  Objects used are placed on tables in sealed seethrough plastic bags before session. Liaising with Council employees to have doors open where this does not pose a fire risk and to check regularly that they have not been moved during the day.  Ensuring guidance on avoiding unnecessary contact with surfaces and regular handwashing/disinfecting is readily available and clear to visitors both online and on arrival at the building.  Checking hand sanitizer is working and is outside the toilet door. Additional guidance for visiting the Old Town Hall to get to the museum found in Risk Assessment for Visitors Old Town Hall.

The Museum of Richmond is located on the second floor of the Old Town Hall on Whittaker Avenue in Richmond. The Old Town Hall is run by London Borough of Richmond upon Thames Council and therefore all access space in the building is controlled by the Council. The Museum only has responsibility and control over the area that the Museum occupies, therefore we will work in consultation with the Council for the safe management of the areas outside the Museum within the Old Town Hall building. The risk assessment below is split into two sections; the first deals with the hazards within the Museum space (for which the Museum is responsible), whilst the second deals with hazards in other areas of the Old Town Hall building (for which the Council is responsible).

You should review your risk assessment if you think it might no longer be valid (eg following an accident in the workplace or if there are any significant changes to hazards, such as new work equipment or work activities)
