
#### EDITORIAL

A further change that you will hear about in future issues, relates to our Digitisation Project. The Museum has acquired a new database called eHive.




This kind of database is an important feature of every modern museum, allowing it to organise, care for and make use of its collection. eHive goes one step further; it allows anyone to access a searchable catalogue online, complete with images. #### EXHIBITIONS

In July we opened our 'Capability 300' exhibition and we have had a lot of great feedback from visitors. This exhibition came to us from Orleans House Gallery. It tells the story of the famous gardener Lancelot 'Capability' Brown, and also of the development of the English landscape garden movement, with its origins in classical, baroque and Chinese imagery. This exhibition will be at the Museum until 29th October, so there is still some time yet to see it.

Our next exhibition will be 'The Royal Star & Garter: 100 Years of Care'. This has very kindly been funded by the Royal Star & Garter itself. This will open on 5th November this year. The exhibition will look at the impact that this famous local institution had, during and beyond the two World Wars of the twentieth century.



We are already at work on our exhibitions for the next year. Our first exhibition new to 2017 will focus on the history of one of Richmond's more interesting streets: Old Palace Lane. This exhibition will open in May 2017 and we will provide more information about it in our next issue.


